

Membership

The North Carolina Prescribed Fire Council, Inc. is exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the IRS code (effective June 16, 2010). The Council operates under a budget that includes income from membership dues.

Membership benefits include:

What is the North Carolina Prescribed Fire Council?

Mission: to foster cooperation among all parties in North Carolina with an interest or stake in prescribed fire.

The North Carolina Prescribed Fire Council brings together natural resource professionals, public and private land managers, and others who support the use of prescribed fire to cooperatively:

- Promote public education about the benefits of prescribed fire.
- Advocate for the ability to use prescribed fire as a land management tool now and in the future.
- Increase expertise in prescribed fire by sharing technical and biological information.
- Promote safety, training, and research in the art and science of prescribed fire.
- Review prescribed fire practices, regulations, and policies and suggest improvements.
- Promote best management practices that minimize smoke and air quality impacts from prescribed fires.



Prescribed Fire Benefits

Prescribed burning is the controlled application of fire to achieve specific objectives.

- Prescribed fire promotes plant and animal species diversity, ecosystem health, and helps control invasive species and insect pests.
- Prescribed fire can be used to improve wildlife habitat, manage competing vegetation, enhance appearance, improve access and perpetuate fire-dependent plants and wildlife.
- Other tools used to control undergrowth, such as herbicides or machinery, can be more expensive and provide fewer benefits to native plants and animals.
- Prescribed Fire reduces buildup of vegetative fuels which can lead to uncontrolled wildfire.
- Prescribed burned forests offer open vistas, more wildflowers, better access, and fewer chiggers and ticks.

North Carolina:

A Fire Dependent State

Most of North Carolina's ecosystems require periodic fire for maintenance, increased productivity, and good health. From the mountains to the coast, North Carolina's forests have been changed and sustained by fire for thousands of years.

Structure and Business

Council Officers and Board members meet quarterly to lead and conduct the business of the Council according to its bylaws. Educational meetings are held each August for the membership and any other interested parties. A committee structure supports the Council's goals and objectives.

Strategic Planning

The North Carolina Prescribed Fire Council has completed a Strategic Plan that shapes the Council's vision, committee structure, as well as goals and objectives for a 5 year period. The plan includes a "Forward/Vision" that documents the history of the Council and provides insight into the role of prescribed fire in North Carolina in the future. The "Goals" section gives broad guidance to help move the Council towards the vision. And finally under each goal are several "Objectives." These objectives fine tune the general goal statements and are specific and achievable.
